Chapter 1: About Neptune® 360™ Mobile

Welcome to the Neptune[®] 360[™] Mobile app. Using a cellular phone or tablet as your meter reading device makes the reading process fast and efficient without the burden of learning new hardware. You can use the app as soon as you install it.

The software has four major functions you can perform that are covered in this guide:

- RFTest.
- Data Logging.
- Meter Reading.
- Pressure Reading.




Figure 1 – Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile Main Screen

Supported Devices and Operating Systems

Neptune 360 Mobile supports Android[™] and Apple[®] operating systems for both phones and tablets. Neptune has tested the mobile app on the following operating systems and performs additional testing as new versions of these operating systems are made available.

Android™ Operating Systems

The mobile app supports Android operating systems 13 and higher.

Android™ Devices

We recommend using Neptune 360 Mobile on devices from the following (Original Equipment Manufacturers) OEMs:

- Google™.
- Motorola[®].
- Samsung[®].

iOS Operating Systems

The mobile app supports iPhone[®] operating systems 15 and higher.

iOS Devices

Neptune 360 Mobile supports the following iOS devices:

- iPhone.
- iPad[®].

Required Devices and Equipment

Following are the devices required to use Neptune 360 Mobile.

• Mobile device – Android or iOS phone or tablet that runs one of the supported operating systems previously listed.



Important! The mobile device requires a minimum of 2 GB of RAM to run the software.


- Transceiver Neptune 360 Mobile pairs with:
 - Neptune belt clip transceiver.
 - MRX v2 or mobile data collector v3 on Android.
 - Mobile data collector v4 on Android and iOS devices.
- Probe reader (optional) Neptune Advantage II, Neptune Pocket ProReader.
- USB tether cable.



Important! If you use an iOS device, you must pair it with a belt clip transceiver.

Required Credentials

Neptune 360 Mobile is linked to the Neptune 360 host software. Utility administrators must ensure that all mobile app users have an account established within the host system. Users can use their host system email address and password credentials to log in to the mobile app.

Chapter 2: Getting Started

This chapter includes the procedures to download and log in to Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile, define the settings, and pair your device with an endpoint.

Downloading the App

Complete the following steps to download the Neptune 360 Mobile app.

- 1. Open the Google Play™ store (Android™*), or the App Store (Apple®) on your device.
- 2. Search for Neptune 360 Mobile.
- 3. Tap one of the following to install the app:
 - Install, for an Android device, and then go to step 4.
 - Get, for an iOS device. You can now open the app and log in.
- 4. On your Android device, review the app permissions, and then tap **Accept** to continue the download.

Logging In and Out of Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile

Make sure you have downloaded and installed Neptune 360 Mobile from the Google Play store (for Android) or the App Store (for iPhone[®]). For the procedure steps, see "Downloading the App" above.

Logging In to Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile

Complete the following steps to log in to Neptune 360 Mobile.

Open the app.
 The Login screen is displayed.

- 2. To select a different default country than the one displayed, tap the country name to display the selections.
- 3. Tap the country you want as your default, and then tap **OK**.
- 4. In the **Email Address** field, type the email address you use for Neptune 360.
- 5. In the **Password** field, type the password you use for Neptune 360.
- 6. Tap Login.

The system displays the Select Site ID screen, if you have access to multiple utilities. Otherwise, the landing screen as shown in step 7 is displayed.




Figure 3 – Select Site ID Screen

7. Type the five-digit Site ID for your utility.

The app displays the Neptune 360 Mobile landing page and you can select the function you want.




Figure 4 – Selecting a Function

8. If you are an ERT customer and are opening the Mobile app for the first time, you must define the setting to enable the app to process ERT readings. See "Modifying Meter Reading Settings" on page 20 for the procedure.

Also, if you use the Pressure Logger and are opening the app for the first time, you must define the setting to enable the app to display the Pressure function. See "Modifying Meter Reading Settings" on page 20 for the procedure.

Logging Out of Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile

You can log out of the app from any screen.

Complete the following steps to log out of Neptune 360 Mobile.

1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the menu options that slide to the right.

2. Tap Log Out to log out of the app.

Resetting Your Password

You can reset a password from your device in the field, without having to call your administrator to reset it for you. You need a network connection to be able to send the reset password email and access the link in the email.

- Open the app.
 The Login screen is displayed.
- 2. Below the Login button, tap Forgot Your Password?

- 2. Type the email address you use for Neptune 360.
- 3. Tap Send Password Reset.
- 4. Tap **OK** to acknowledge the sent email message.
- 5. Follow the prompts in the email to reset your password.

Unlocking Locked and Inactive Accounts

If you are locked out of your Neptune 360 account, the app displays a message indicating your account is locked. Reasons for a locked account include:

- Three or more faulty attempts at logging in to the system.
- Your account is currently inactive.
- An administrator has manually locked your account or set it to inactive.
- 1. Tap **OK** to clear the locked account notification.
- 2. Contact the administrator for your utility to unlock your account.

Pairing a Receiver

Before reading meters, you must pair your device with a receiver. A typical receiver used is a belt clip transceiver. If you have not yet paired a receiver, the first time you select **Meter Reading** the system displays a reminder.

- 1. After logging in, tap Meter Reading, and then tap OK to clear the reminder message.
- 2. Pair one of the recommended transceivers with your device. See "Getting Started" on page 5, or "Pairing a Mobile Data Collector" on page 11.

Pairing a Belt Clip Transceiver

Receivers that display in green text indicate that the receivers have been connected previously.

- Turn on the belt clip transceiver and place it in Normal Mode. The LED color for Normal Mode is green. For more information about the belt clip transceiver, see the "Neptune Handheld Systems Users' Manual."
- On your Android or iOS device, enable Bluetooth capability. For Android, verify that the **Location** permission for the app is enabled. This permission handles Bluetooth functionality and is here in your Android settings: Settings > Apps > Application Manager > Neptune 360 Mobile.
- 3. Log in to Neptune 360 Mobile and tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the menu options.

- 4. Tap Receiver.
- 5. Tap the serial number of the belt clip transceiver in the list to pair with it. If the belt clip transceiver does not appear in the list, tap **Refresh** toward the bottom of the screen, and then retry pairing.

After successfully pairing, the Neptune 360 Mobile dashboard is displayed and toward the bottom of the screen the connected belt clip transceiver displays in green text.

Receiver Settings

After you pair a belt clip or MRX, on the home page you see the belt clip ID in green and an **Info** button you tap to display the Receiver Info screen. The RF Mode field on this screen enables you to select the RF mode. You can choose efficiency and performance, which improves or decreases RF performance and inversely decreases or increases battery life for the receiver.

- Performance Mode increases the speed of processing readings, but can reduce battery life of the receiver.
- Efficiency Mode reduces the speed of processing readings, but helps save the battery life of the receiver.
- Moderate Mode default mode. Functions between the two other options in terms of processing speed and battery life.




Figure 9 - Receiver Information

Pairing a Mobile Data Collector

Complete the following steps to pair your device with a mobile data collector.

- 1. Turn on the mobile data collector and wait approximately one minute for the receiver to gain full power. See the "Mobile Data Collector Getting Started Guide" for the steps to
- 2. plug in the power cable and install the mobile data collector antenna.

- 3. On your Android or iOS device, enable Bluetooth capability. For Android, verify that the **Location** permission for the app is enabled. This permission handles Bluetooth functionality and is here in your Android settings: Settings > Apps > Application Manager > Neptune 360 Mobile.
- 4. Log in to Neptune 360 Mobile and tap the icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the menu options.

- 5. Tap Receiver.
- 6. Tap the serial number of the mobile data collector to pair with it. If the mobile data collector does not appear in the list, tap **Refresh** toward the bottom of the screen and then retry pairing.

After successfully pairing, the Neptune 360 Mobile dashboard is displayed and toward the bottom of the screen the connected mobile data collector displays in green text.

Modifying the Neptune[®] 360™ Settings

You can configure the Display Previous Readings setting for Neptune 360 Mobile when you first set up your web application system. You define this setting within Neptune 360. The setting has a Yes or No option:

• Display Previous Readings – displays the previous reading for each meter, using the Prev Read field from your import file.



Important! If any of the Neptune 360 Mobile Settings are changed, users actively logged into Neptune 360 Mobile must log out and log back in to the application to receive the updated settings.

- Display High / Low Limits displays the high limit and low limit for each meter, using the High Limit and Low Limit fields from your import file.
- Apply High / Low Limits verifies captured readings against the high and low limits set for each meter.



Important! If you manually enter a reading greater than or less than a meter's limits, the system prompts you to confirm whether the entered reading is correct. You do not need to enter the reading again. The system labels manually-entered readings outside the limits as Keyed High or Keyed Low. Confirmation prompts do not appear for radio or probed readings that are greater than or less than limits. However, the readings are still labeled as Radio High or Radio Low.

• Force Reading Reentry – requires meter readers to type the same reading again for verification, if manually-entered readings match the high or low thresholds.



Important! You can only enable this reading if the Apply High / Low Limits setting is enabled.

Editing the Settings

Follow these steps to edit the Neptune 360 Mobile Settings within Neptune 360.

- 1. On the Settings screen, select **Neptune 360 Mobile Settings**, and then tap **Edit** to enable the settings.
- 2. Select **Yes** or **No** as the desired setting in each field.
- 3. Tap **Save** to save the settings.

Modifying Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile Settings

You can define the settings on your mobile device that are specific to the Neptune 360 Mobile app:

- **Miscellaneous** define the font size for displaying Neptune 360 mobile data, select the receiver connection type, and enable command logging, which allows additional receiver diagnostic information to be gathered via the app.
- Data Log define meter size and reverse flow options.

- **Pressure** define low and high pressure limits and enable the display feature to hide or show pressure on the dashboard.
- Meter Reading define meter reading alert, enable real time reading, process ERT readings, display the keyboard automatically when a reader opens an order, enable and remove offline maps, and reset meter reading database.

Modifying the Receiver Connection Type

Miscellaneous Settings allow you to select the receiver connection type. The receiver connection type default is Bluetooth, but you have the option to select USB.

- If your current connection type is not Bluetooth and you select Bluetooth, the app uses Bluetooth connection searches on all Receiver screens.
- When you select receiver type connection USB, the app uses USB connection searches on all Receiver screens.
- If you are connected to an MRX v2 via USB on Android, you see "MRX920" and the MRX v2 serial number in green on the home page.

Complete the following steps to modify the receiver connection type.

1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the dashboard.

- 2. Tap Settings.
- 3. Tap Miscellaneous.
- 4. Select the receiver option you want.

Connecting an MRX v2 Device

You can connect an MRX v2 to your Android device using a USB tether.



Important! Receiver information and battery information normally available by clicking (the information button) on the Home screen is not available while using a USB tether connection.



- 2. On your mobile device, tap the menu icon on the main screen.
- 3. Select **Receiver** and wait until you see the MRX v2 receiver in the list.

4. Tap the MRX v2 option to connect to the receiver and redisplay the Home page on your mobile device.

MRX920 displays in green at the bottom of the screen. You can now read meters and perform RF tests using your mobile device.




Figure 13 - Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile Home Screen

Modifying Data Log Settings

The Data Log settings enable you to reset the meter size, hide reverse flow meters, and reset the data log database.

Complete the following steps to modify the settings.

1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the menu options.

- 2. Tap Settings.
- 3. Tap **Data Log** to display the options.

- 4. Slide the buttons to the right for the options you want to enable:
 - Always Reset Meter Size (enabled by default) reset the meter size each time you capture a new data log session. See "Logging Data" on page 29.
 - Hide Reverse Flow hide meters experiencing reverse flow.
 - Reset Data Log Database delete all data log information from your device.

Modifying the Font Size

Miscellaneous settings allow you to set the font size for the Neptune 360 Mobile list displays.

Complete the following steps to modify the font size.

- 1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the dashboard.
- 2. Tap Settings.
- 3. Tap Miscellaneous, and then tap Default to display the List View Font Size options.

4. Select the font size you want, and then confirm your selection.

Enabling the Command Logging

Miscellaneous settings allow you to enable command logging which allows additional receiver diagnostic information to be gathered via the app.

Complete the following steps to enable command logging.

- 1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the dashboard.
- 2. Tap Settings.
- 3. Tap **Miscellaneous**, and then move the **Enable Command Logging** slide bar to the right to enable the setting.

Modifying the Display Pressure Feature

You can modify the high or low pressure warning limits and display or hide the pressure reading on the Neptune 360 dashboard.

Complete the following steps to modify the setting.

1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the dashboard.

2. Tap Settings.

3. Tap **Pressure** to display the options.

4. Move the Display Pressure Feature slide bar left and right to hide or display meter pressure on the dashboard.

Modifying the High or Low Pressure Warning Limits

You can modify the high and low pressure warning limits.

Complete the following steps to modify the settings.

1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the dashboard.

- 2. Tap Settings.
- 3. Tap **Pressure** to display the options.

Modifying Meter Reading Settings

Meter reading settings allow you to enable a tone when your device reads a meter and enable real time readings. You can also reset the reading database.

Complete the following steps to modify the settings.

1. Tap the menu icon in the top left corner of the screen to display the dashboard.

- 2. Tap Settings.
- 3. Tap Meter Reading to display the options.

- 4. Slide the buttons to the right for the options you want to enable, or tap the options to remove or reset:
 - Enable Tone play a tone when a reading is captured.
 - Enable Real Time automatically unload readings to Neptune 360 based on a predefined interval (every 15 minutes).
 - Process ERT Readings enable the app to process readings from ERT endpoints.

- Prompt Keyboard on Meter Page enables the keyboard to display automatically when a reader opens an order.
- Enable Offline Maps enable the maps assigned to you for meter reading.
- Remove Offline Maps remove the offline maps when you no longer need them to free up space on your device.
- Reset Meter Reading Database delete all captured readings from your device.
- 5. If you enable offline maps for the first time, the system displays a prompt to download any offline maps assigned to you. Tap **OK** to begin downloading the maps assigned to you.

Chapter 3: Testing the RF Signal

The RF Test feature allows you to verify that your device can receive readings from an endpoint using a paired belt clip transceiver or mobile data collector.

Receiving Transmissions

Follow the steps to test receiving transmissions from any endpoint in the area.

1. In the app, tap RF Test.

The system displays the RF Test screen.




Figure 25 - RF Test Screen

2. Tap **Start** to begin receiving transmissions. After you tap Start, the text changes to Stop.

The code SCM (Standard Consumption Message) next to the total number of endpoints in the header indicates ERT reading is enabled and the system is able to capture ERT endpoint readings.




Figure 26 - RF Test Transmissions

3. To clear the screen of the transmissions, tap Clear.



Important! Unique endpoints display to show how many unique endpoints have been "heard" since you last tapped Start. The count value for each endpoint shows how many readings your device captured since transmission began. The latest reading is always displayed.

Searching for Endpoints

You can search for a specific endpoint and display the details.

1. In the MIU ID field, type a full or partial ID to display a list of matching endpoints.

The app displays the endpoints that match the part of the ID you typed.

Filtering Endpoints

You can filter the list of endpoint transmissions to organize the list by a certain flag or other criteria.

Complete the following steps to filter the endpoints.

1. Tap the filter icon in the top right corner of the screen to display the filter options.




Figure 27 - Filtering the Endpoints List

Chapter 4: Logging Data

The Data Logging feature allows you to retrieve up to 96 days of hourly reading consumption data from endpoints. You can display the data in graph or report format, which you can share with the homeowner as well as the utility office.

Meters using E-CODER[®] registers can capture and share flagged data such as continuous consumption, tamper, and reverse flow data.

Viewing a Past Data Log Session

You can view past data logging sessions and search for a data log for a specific endpoint.

Complete the following steps to view a past data log session.

1. In the app, tap Data Logging.

The system displays a list of past logging sessions.

2. Tap a session.

The app displays the data log for that session. You can search for a data log of a specific endpoint. See "Testing the RF Signal" on page 23.

Deleting a Past Data Log Session

You can delete past data log sessions from your device.

- 1. Tap **Edit** in the top right of the screen.
- 2. Select the sessions you want to delete, and then tap **Delete** in the bottom left corner of the screen. See the figure on the previous page.

Capturing a New Data Log Session

To start a new data log session, first verify that your device is paired to a belt clip transceiver or mobile data collector.

Complete the following steps to capture a new data log session.

1. Tap Capture New Session.

The system displays the Capture Settings screen.




Figure 31 - Capture Settings Screen

- 2. Select the data log session type:
 - Data Log captures and logs live readings
 - Off Cycle facilitates the retrieval of off-cycle reads used for move in / move out readings and for other unique requests for a specific day's reading. For this option, you must specify the date and MIU ID.
- 3. Select the capture method:
 - RF Radio Frequency.
 - IR Infrared signal. If you select this option, skip step 4.
- 4. Do one of the following. If you selected:
 - IR, go to step 5.
 - RF, tap MIU ID and type the full or partial ID for the endpoint.
- 5. Tap **Unit Of Measure** and select the desired unit of measure.
- 6. Tap Meter Size and scroll to select the size.

7. Tap **Capture** on the screen to start the data log session.

After the system starts downloading data, it displays the data log.

Reviewing a Data Log in List View

Each row in the initial main data log screen shows the date, reading, and consumption. You can tap a row that contains a flag to open a popup and display the details. To view a specific date, either scroll through the list or tap the date on the screen.

Complete the following steps to review a data log list.

1. Tap a reading flag to see hour-by-hour readings.

2. If you want to change the meter size and readings, tap **Meter Size** in the bottom right corner of the screen.

Viewing a Data Log as a Graph

You can view the data log in graph format.

Complete the following steps to display log data as a graph.




Figure 35 - Log Data as a Graph




Figure 36 – Data Log Statuses

- Queued the Data Log is loaded to be transmitted, but transmission is pending the user's access to cell service to push it to the Web app.
- Uploading the Data Log transmission to the Web app is in progress.
- Completed the Data Log has successfully transmitted to the Web app.




Figure 37 - Selecting the Graph Format

Chapter 5: Reading Meters

This chapter defines how to read meters using the Neptune[®] 360™ Mobile app on your device.

Reading Meters

The Meter Reading feature allows you to capture readings for routes that have been imported into Neptune 360 for your utility. You can also manually key a reading for any account, or skip a reading and apply a skip code. After you capture or key readings, you can sync them to Neptune 360.



Important! The app automatically syncs with Neptune 360 *only* if you have no readings in the database of the mobile app. If there are existing readings in the database of the app, it does not automatically sync when you access the Meter Reading feature.

Captured readings are displayed in order of the time they were captured. This feature supports probe reading using an Advantage II probe or Pocket ProReader and a belt clip transceiver.

Following is a sample Meters screen that shows a metrics bar above the search bar that shows:

- Left number number of routes included on the current Meters page.
- Center number number of meters / total number of routes when the All filter is selected. When you tap:
 - Missed, the number changes to display the number of missed readings / total number of meters.
 - Invalid, the number changes to display meters with invalid readings / total number of meters.
 - Captured, the number changes to display meters with captured readings / total number of meters.

• Right number – reading completion percentage. Displays 100% when all readings are captured for the routes.




Figure 38 – Meters Screen

Route Management

If your account's role includes the Sync Unassigned Routes permission (assigned to you in the web application), you can see:

- Routes assigned to you from Route Management.
- Incomplete unassigned routes.
- The code SCM (Standard Consumption Message) next to the timestamp in the header indicates ERT reading is enabled and the system is able to capture ERT endpoint readings.

If you tap an unassigned route and assign it to yourself, the route moves to Assigned Routes.

Selecting Meters to Read

Follow the steps in this procedure to select the meters to read.

1. On your device, tap Meter Reading.

The Route Management screen is displayed showing routes that have not been read.




Figure 40 - Unread Routes



Important! If your utility does not have any routes that are missing readings, the device displays, "No routes with missed orders are available." If in the past you selected a route to read and the current status of the route is In Progress, the app asks whether you want to sync again, since there could have been changes made to your routes within Neptune 360.

- 2. To assign yourself individual routes and move them to the Assigned Routes list (routes in the Not Ready state), tap each unassigned route, and then in the confirmation dialog box that displays, tap **Yes** to sync the device and move the routes. The device:
 - Sends any captured readings to Neptune 360.
 - Removes completed captured readings.
 - Updates the status of the routes you selected to In Progress.

3. To view all meters and accounts within the selected routes on a single page, tap **Select**, and then tap **Work Routes**.




Figure 42 - Work Routes View

Unassigning Routes

If you assign yourself a route by accident, you can unassign the route so that another reader can pick it up. You must have permission to sync unassigned routes to unassign them.

1. On the Route Management screen, tap **Select** in the bottom right corner of the screen.

2. Select one or more routes assigned to you that you want to unassign, and then tap **Unassign**.

The system displays a confirmation message.




Figure 43 – Unassign Routes Confirmation

3. Tap **Yes** to confirm you want to unassign the routes.

The system syncs all captured readings for the routes you selected to unassign, and then unassigns the routes and places them in the Unassigned Routes list.

Starting the Reading Meter Function

When your device has routes in the In Progress state, you can start the reading process.

Starting the Reading Function for a Mobile Device

Complete the following steps to start the reading function to read meters using a mobile device.



Important! This procedure applies only when you perform readings using a belt clip transceiver or mobile data collector. This procedure is not required when you manually enter readings.

1. Tap **Start** in the bottom right corner of the screen, or tap the icon in the top right corner of the screen.

- 2. If mobile mapping is enabled for your utility and you are using an:
 - Android[™]* device, your location is already tracked because it is required when using Bluetooth[®].
 - iOS device, go to step 3.
- 3. Tap the desired location access option:
 - Only while using the app.
 - Always allow.
 - Don't allow.

The icon flashes to indicate that the connected receiver is listening for readings for the accounts in the routes. As the device captures readings the completion percent increases to 100%. Any sounds that your device produces means it is accepting readings.

Starting the Reading Function for a Probed Meter



Important! The Advantage II and Pocket ProReader can read ProRead™ registers, E-CODER® (BASIC) registers, and Sensus ECR II and III TouchRead receptacles. The Sensus ECR III must be programmed with the same format used for the "6 wheel ECR II register."

Complete the following steps to start the reading function for probed meters.

- 1. Pair the belt clip transceiver with your mobile device. For the step procedure, see "Pairing a Receiver" on page 9.
- 2. Tap **Start** in the bottom right corner of the screen, or tap the icon in the top right corner of the Neptune 360 Mobile screen.
- 3. Use the probe reader to read the meters.

 The receiver sends the collected readings to Neptune 360 Mobile, which you can view.

Correcting a Missing Meter ID

There may be times when you perform a probe reading and the reading cannot be linked via a meter ID. When this occurs, the system displays an icon (finger pushing a button) between the Accept and Skip icons.



Important! This icon is only visible on the Meter page and the reading selected is linked to that meter.

1. Tap the finger pushing a button icon to display the readings you can apply to the account.




Figure 45 - Correct a Missing Meter

2. Select a reading and then tap **Confirm**.

There are situations in which this window displays multiple readings. If so, select a reading to assign to the first meter. After displaying the next meter and clicking the icon again, one less value in the **Select a reading** field is displayed for selection.

Stopping the Reading Meter Function

You can stop the meter reading process at any time.

1. Tap **Stop** in the bottom right corner of the screen, or tap the icon in the top right corner of the screen.

Adding Comments and Comment Codes

You can enter free form comments for any meter reading that are specific to that reading, route, or account. You can also apply predefined comments to any reading by selecting a comment code. An administrator creates these comments in the Neptune 360 web application and includes information that applies to meter reading cycles or routes. Comments and comment codes are optional and you can view them in an export file generated in the Neptune 360 web application.



Important! To see the most recent comment codes, sync the data between Neptune 360 Mobile and the web application. For more information, see "Syncing or Unloading Captured Readings" on page 51.

Adding a Comment

The Comments box is displayed by default on the Meter screen and you can type up to 128 characters for the comment.

1. Tap in the Comments box, and then type a comment.

Selecting a Comment Code

You can select from a list of comment codes created in the Neptune 360 web application to associate with the comments you enter.

1. Tap the **Comment Codes** field label to display the Code 1 and Code 2 fields.

- 3. Tap the Code label to redisplay the **Comments** field. For more information about adding comments, see "Adding a Comment" on the previous page.

Syncing or Unloading Captured Readings

You can synchronize captured readings with the Neptune 360 web application on the Route Management screen. If you have at least one reading captured, Neptune Mobile does not automatically sync with Neptune 360, so follow this procedure any time you want to sync your readings.



Important! Neptune 360 Mobile must be connected to a network for syncing to occur.




Figure 48 - Captured Readings

Viewing Meter Information

You can drill down to access meter information for any meter with the status **In Progress**. You can filter a list of meters to either show only missed readings or only captured readings.

Viewing Accounts within a Route

Make sure you select a route with the status In Progress.

Complete the following steps to view accounts within a route.

1. Tap the route for which you want to view the accounts. By default, this screen displays all accounts within the route.





Figure 51 - Warning Messages

Invalid Readings

Neptune 360 Mobile sounds a tone when your device acquires an invalid reading. On the Meters page, the text for the reading is in orange instead of green. When you tap the meter with the invalid reading, the text for the reading on the individual meter page is also in orange.



Important! Be sure to enable the sound on your device to hear the tones when you receive an invalid reading.

Viewing Meter Details

The Meter Detail screen displays additional detail about the account, the meter, and the reading.

1. On the Meter screen, tap Additional Info.

The system displays the Meter Detail screen. All information is defined in the Neptune 360 software:

- Route route number for the account / meter.
- Account Number number for the account.
- Utility Type type of utility for the meter reading.
- Meter Type class of meter.
- Read Type type of reading on the meter.
- Dials number of dials on the meter.
- Codes codes or instructions assigned to the meter including hazard codes, special instructions, meter location codes, read instruction codes, and meter condition codes. Codes are set in the import file that is uploaded into Neptune 360 and you cannot change them.
- Comment codes and associated comments a meter reader assigns.

Editing Dials

The number of meter dials is defined in the billing files imported into Neptune 360. You can change the number of meter dials your device reads. For example, a utility may be interested in reading only the first four dials.

- 1. On the Meter Detail screen, tap Additional Info.
- 2. Tap the pencil icon beside Dials.
- 3. Edit the number of dials you want to read for this meter.

Using the Map Function

The Mobile Mapping feature allows you to visually track meters and your meter reading progress. You must enable your device's location and the map and geocoding permissions to enable the functions and track your movements on the map. You can:

- Locate meters, which show as pins on the map.
- Determine meter status based on the pin color.
- Toggle the map style between street and satellite.
- See your current location on the map and where you have been on your route.

Using Offline Maps

Your utility can assign offline maps to use for reading meters when the cell service is limited or no WiFi is available, so you have access to offline maps at all times. Your utility can assign and unassign different maps to routes via Neptune 360 as needed. For more information on the map assignment in Neptune 360, refer to the Neptune 360 Help.

After one or more maps are assigned to you, you can enable the maps for use.

Displaying the Map Style

You can toggle between a street map style and the satellite map style.




Figure 59 - Map Styles

- 1. After selecting a route, on the Meters screen tap the map icon in the top right corner of the screen.
 - The system displays the street map by default.
- 2. To display the satellite map, tap the map style icon (

).

Displaying Pin Details

You can display the details for each meter pin on the map, regardless of the status (color) of the pin.

- Tap the pin for which you want to display details.
 The system adjusts the map to show the pin you tapped in the center of the map and displays the following:
 - Customer name.
 - Address.
 - Endpoint / meter ID.
 - Reading if you have not captured a reading, the pin is red and the label is Unread. If applicable, an associated flag displays to the right of the reading.
- 2. Tap the space beside the reading to display the pin in the Meters screen.

Chapter 6: Reading and Logging Pressure

Pressure readings include the endpoint (MIU) ID, the pressure graph, and the high and low limits for the pressure log. Like the meter readings, the system stores a maximum of 96 days of pressure readings.



Important! A pressure monitor on the meter connected to a cellular endpoint is required to take pressure readings.

Capturing a Pressure Reading

To take a pressure reading, verify that your device is paired with a belt clip transceiver or mobile data collector.

To capture a pressure reading, follow these steps.

1. In the app, tap Pressure.

- 2. In the MIU ID field, type the ID number for an endpoint.
- 3. Tap **Capture** to obtain the pressure reading for the endpoint.

The app can wait up to 30 seconds to receive the pressure reading. The reading displays in the center of the gauge and the needle indicates the pressure range, which should be in the green zone.

Viewing Logged Pressure Readings

The pressure log displays the pressure data logged for an endpoint. A pressure log displays the following information:

- Endpoint ID.
- Dates of the previous 96 days.
- Time the data was retrieved (in 24-hour format).
- High and low limits.

To log the pressure reading for an endpoint, follow these steps.

- 1. In the app, tap Pressure.
- 2. Tap **Pressure Log** in the bottom right corner of the Pressure screen.

The system displays the following screen.

3. Tap a past session to display the pressure log for the session.


Figure 62 - Pressure Data Log
